#### A. Executive Summary

## AN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Criterion-wise analysis of our college clearly reveals our certain treasure troves, the embedded weakness and also its initiatives taken to make up its deficiencies at the earliest. It is our solemn pledge that whatever new initiative taken to corner up our deficiencies will by no means be a temporary arrangement on the so called makeshift arrangement on the part of our college authority and its associate stake holders. The main strength of our college is the follows:

- The basic philosophy of our college is to embarrass all categories of students irrespective of their caste and creed, coming from diverse background in and around the district of Bankura, economically-backward district in the state of west Bengal.
- 2) It has all embracing guiding spirit inherited from the ideals, thought and actions of a 'Universal Mother'. Ma Saradamani, a divine consort of Lord Sri Ramkrishna. This creates an academic ambience which would always inspire us and always set to right path for students.
- 3) In terms of infrastructural facilities the position of our college in this district is worth mentioning though there are certain aspects which need to be developed and procured.
- 4) Improvement of the library service is reflected through full-computerization of the library system, digitization of the lending system in the library, purchase of latest text and reference books and journals etc. INFLIBNET facility and an e-shelf containing thousand of books and journals are made available in the library for all the stakeholders.
- 5) Our college performs as a family where each member's opinion is taken care of before coming to a final discussion. Thus we believe the philosophy of joint decision-making and diversity in thinking at every stage of our development.

- 6) At present, the college is not in too stringent condition from financial point of view and simultaneously it does not rotate on more profit earning attitude. This supports the welfare approach of the Institution.
- 7) Regarding utilization of grants received from various agencies including all out attention to research project works, seminars, and workshops has been taken utmost care.
- 8) Community services, health services, performance in sports activities have been continuing as inseparable something. These activities have linked the institution with greater aspect and perspective of social need and all out development of students.
- 9) The college has the unique distinction of introducing "Parents-Teachers Meeting" so as to meet the parents, listen to their grievances, suggestions and then talk of modalities for the betterment of academic ambience in the college- though we are in the habit of meeting them whenever a problem regarding their ward arises.

- 4) Activities, support and active involvement from the Alumni Association should be maintained as a continuous process in respect of quality assurance and revenue generation for the overall development of our college. Introduction and continuation of Placement Service is a must since the same is the demand of the day.

- 4) Well maintained campus with sufficient number of classroom, smart class room, well maintained computerized and digitized library, well equipped laboratories and clean and green campus
- 5) ICT enabled teaching learning methodology, Wi-Fi and Wi-Max Networking on campus with internet connectivity and competent faculty and stuff conversant with ICT technology
- 6) Inter-personal relationship among teachers, students and staff are very cordial

#### Weaknesses

- 1. Shortage of teaching and non-teaching staff in comparison to the enrolment of students
- 2. Lack of formal collaboration of industry institute
- 3. Inadequate professional and vocational programmes

- 1. Wonderful academic ambience and overall discipline in the college
- 2. Opportunity for initiating many result-oriented consultancy and extension activities
- 3. More skill development programmes may be launched under Community College.
- 4. Scope of generating funds through research projects
- 5. Introduction of PG courses in Bengali, English and History

## Challenges

- Recruitment of competent faculty on vacant sanctioned posts and creation of new post are the crucial challenges for appointing authority as the matter is depended upon the State Govt. Policy
- 2. Sustaining the pace of development and quality education in view of global trained in higher education
- 3. To introduce some more PG courses like MSW and Music for an optimum utilization of the infrastructure by two PG study centres, being run through distance mode within the campus under Rabindra Bharati University and The University of Burdwan

#### Future plans

- 1. To organize more skill development training for both teaching and nonteaching staff for being well acquainted with modern gadgets and e-resources
- 2. To make students well verse in National and International languages
- To enlighten villagers and slum dwellers through value education by NSS volunteers of the college to help poor farmers and artisans by virtue of technical training etc.
- 4. To enhance the practice of Intra-college and Inter college Faculty Exchange Programme

- 5. To well-equip the newly built multi-purpose seminar hall cum auditorium with inbuilt Public Address System and proper light arrangements
- 6. To arrange bus service for students coming from different places of the town
- 7. To buy additional plot of land outside of the campus for future expansion of the campus.

#### Post-accreditation Initiatives

Bankura Zilla Saradamani Mahila Mahavidyapith was accredited by NAAC in March, 2007. The college was awarded Grade- B+ (CGPA): 76.50). The peer team made some valuable recommendations for some more positive steps under different parameters of assessment.

- 1. IQAC: The college established Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) during 2008 with dynamic and experienced members from the faculty and some renowned persons from the local administration and the Member of Parliament of Bankura constituency. A separate office had been allotted to the cell with necessary infrastructure and other logistic supports. The cell has the collection of feedbacks on the basis of which it recommends all-round development of the college and preparing recommendation. Experts from different Universities were contacted by the cell and their visits were arranged to this institution for obtaining their suggestions for enhancement in quality education of the institution. The Principal and the coordinator, the IQAC had visited other institution to obtain information on best practices if different spheres of education and administration as well. IQAC convened meetings for introducing new courses on the basis of peer team recommendations new infrastructure and up-gradation of laboratories and library were also made on the recommendation of IQAC.
- 2. Course diversification: During the last five years the college has introduced two new subjects Music and Education and some job oriented courses like Computer Course in Office Automation and Internet, Spoken English, Spoken Sanskrit, Creative Dance and Music.
- 3. Up gradation of laboratories: With the help of UGC and State Govt.

- funds the college upgraded its laboratories by furnishing them and purchasing new equipments and apparatus.
- 4. Up-gradation of library: The college library has been fully computerized and the process of lending books in the library has been digitized and an eshelf has been installed in the library which contains thousands of books and journals. Prof. Bratya Basu, honorable Ex-Minister-in-Charge, the Ministry of Education, Govt. of West Bengal and Prof. Ashis Bandyopadhyay, honorable Parliamentary Secretary, Minister of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal have presently visited the college library and classrooms. They have expressed their satisfaction and happiness after watching the infrastructure and teaching-learning- evaluation methodology adopted by different departments of the college.
- 5. E-Administration: The College augmented the process of e-administration in the college. Admission, fee collection, pay roll, accounting, report generation were covered under specially designed CAMS software. Few staff have been trained for handling the software. The library software SOUL 1.0 has been replaced by the latest SOUL 2.0. Every faculty members have been provided laptop computers with internet facilities.
- **6.** Research promotion cell: To promote the research and academic activities in the college, this cell has been formed comprising of some senior faculty members. The cell provides logistic support to the faculty members.

Minor research projects were taken up during the last five years.

- 7. Infrastructure: During last five years the college campus has been radically changed. Following infrastructure have been added to the college:—
- Three M.P. LAD buildings, one building funded by the MLA, one gymnasium building funded by the donor member on the GB, two classroom buildings funded by UGC have been built. The construction of a UGC funded huge hostel building has been going on, the ground floor of which has been completed and being used by the boarders.

- Two cycle stands have been built.
- Two big size water purifier cum chiller machines have been installed in the campus.
- One multipurpose seminar hall cum auditorium has been built by utilizing the State Government fund.
- One Smart Class Room has been arranged which is shared by different departments.
- One Green Effect Silence Genset has been installed for uninterrupted power supply along with two other manually operated generators.
- One English language lab has been established and supervised by the faculty members of the department of English.
- From all buildings of the college are being maintained from the internal sources of the college.
- Wi-Fi and Wi-Max networking has been done in the college. Internet facilities
  are provided with 2 Mbps bandwidth connectivity to four departments,
  library and office.
- Arrangements have been made for supplying purified cold water in two separate places of the college.
- Remedial coaching centre for SC/ST/Minority students, one career counseling centre, one coaching centre for entry in services have been established and managed efficiently by the faculty members.
- College campus has been beautified by one rose garden and three other gardens on the campus are made and well-maintained.
- CCTV camera has been installed at prime locations to monitor activity on the campus.
- 8. National seminar and workshop: The college organized eight UGC sponsored, one NAAC sponsored, two Victoria Memorial Hall, Kolkata sponsored, one ICPR sponsored and one State Govt. Sponsored National and State level Seminars, and one UGC sponsored workshop, besides special lectures delivered by visiting faculty members during last five years.

- ▶ Bankura Zilla Saradamani Mahila Mahavidyapith was started with the vision and mission as follows:-

Vision:

Enlightenment and Personality Development of younger women generation specially coming from remote and rural areas in and around the district of Bankura through imparting general Education in order to culminate them an asset to the Nation.

<u>Mission</u>: To make whole hearted collective efforts to provide an infrastructure for imparting quality and need best education to the students.

Goals:

- i. Providing quality education in modern disciplines
- ii. Educating new women generation in contemporary knowledge and skill to meet the challenges of nation building
- iii. Inculcating a sense of dignity, sincerity, dynamism, truthfulness and above all a sense of national pride and universal brotherhood among the students in order to develop them into socially responsible citizens
- iv. Diversifying teaching programme in changing situation to keep up pace with the socio-economic demands of the time
- v. To provide a platform to the students giving them opportunities to face the challenges of the competitive world with utmost utilization of their potentials in academic event and sports
- vi. To inculcate values like self-respect, social equality. National integration, secularism and brotherhood by organizing various activities in the college
- vii. Empowerment and realization of dignity in women
- viii. To provide special attention to ladies welfare programmes
- ix. To develop the creative writing ability of the students by publishing wallpapers rand college annual magazine
- x. To provide opportunities to the teaching and non-teaching staff to acquire higher qualification
- xi. To promote teachers to participate in State, National and International conferences, workshops and seminars

The above vision and mission statement is displayed on the hording of the college campus and on the college website <a href="www.bzsmcollege.org">www.bzsmcollege.org</a> for information to all the students, staffs and other stakeholders. It is also communicated to the student by the principal and other senior teachers during Fresher's Welcome of the newly admitted students. The students are made to learn these values in course of mobilization of NSS units. This mission is suggested through frequent seminars and in the meeting of the staff council.

# 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

▶ During the beginning of new academic session in July, the head of various departments discuses the course plan with faculty members of the departments. The Routine Committee, formed by the Teachers' Council prepares detailed routine as per suggestion of respective heads. The meeting of Heads of department is held under the Chairmanship of Principal to obtain suggestion to academic improvements.

## 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

▶ The University often conducted orientation courses, syllabus committee, and academic council meeting where teachers have the opportunities to discuss, upgrade and additional measure for revision and an implementation of curriculum. In this meeting there is also scope for discussing the nitty-gritty of the subjects to be incorporated in the lecture method in the class room teaching by the teachers. The university also conducts orientation programme and refreshers course for upgrading and updating the teachers in order to make them more alert, dynamic and effective in class room teaching.

## 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

▶ General classes and tutorials carry out the curriculum. The college provides classroom facilities as per the routine to all the departments, as well as contingences for practical classes are provided. The new and updated equipments for laboratories are provided to lab-based departments. The books for seminar and other materials for classroom teaching are provided to all the departments. Many departments like Geography, Mathematics, Chemistry and Physics are provided with computers, laser printers, LCD projector etc. Each and every permanent faculty members is provided with a laptop. A Smart Class Room with modern digital equipments has been provided. Any department can use it. A new digital library has been constructed for this purpose.

To ensure the curriculum delivery and transcription on the curricular provided by the affiliating university, the classroom evaluation are made by the faculty members. They also take remedial coaching classes for the backward students such as SC, ST, and OBC etc.

- 1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?
- ▶ The placement cell of the college tries the best to contract various units of the economy in order to provide at-least a footprint for the pass out as well as the running students which, in turn, the college transmits to the university.

- ▶ The curriculum is developed by the parent university through the Board of Studies of various subjects. Many experienced senior faculty members of our instauration serve as members in these boards and while they are invited to participate in the meeting of Board of Studies they play effective and active role in developing, designing, framing and modifying syllabi of the degree course from time to time.

- ▶ The college does not frame curricular independently for any of the courses but the faculty members contribute in this regard to the parent university.

- ▶ The institution can analyze that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation through assessing and evaluating the result of the final examinations and through the successful engagement of the students in Govt. and public services in later lives.

- ▶ The goals and objectives of the syllabus taught is all-round development of the

students in tune with the vision and mission of the college. The college imparts education leading to award of bachelor degree in 13 subjects and to award of PG degree in Distance Mode of Education in 9 subjects.

- ▶ The institution besides these UG and PG (Distance Mode) programmes arranges for some certificate courses such as computer application, spoken English, spoken Sanskrit, creative dance, music, beautician course etc. Any student of this college may complete the course and gain twinning degree/ certificate one for UG and other for certificate course.

The college offers various provisions with reference to the academic flexibility in concurrence with the rules and regulation of the mother university such as -

- **A)** For Science Stream :
- i) Physics + Chemistry + Mathematics;
- **B)** For Arts Stream: A student of the B.A. general course is required to take the following subjects:
  - i) Bengali/Alt Bengali; ii) English /Alt English; iii) Any two from the following core subjects:
  - a) Economics; b) Political Science; c) Education; d) Philosophy; e) History

- f) Geography; g) Sanskrit; h) Music
- Major Options: A student may offer major course in any of the following Subjects:
  - a) English; b) Bengali; c) Economics; d) Political Science; e) Sanskrit; f) Philosophy;
  - g) History; h) Geography; i) Mathematics.

#### Note:

- 1) For a student offering major course in any subject mentioned above other than English and Bengali, General English and Bengali/Alt. English are compulsory and in addition to this, two core subjects shall have to be chosen from the core subjects (leaving out the Major subject itself).
- 2) A student offering Major in English shall have to opt for two core subjects except English. 3) A student offering Major in Bengali shall have to opt for two core subjects except Bengali.
- **4)** A student shall be allowed to opt for the subjects shown below even if he/she has not studied the subjects in the qualifying exam. i) Philosophy; **ii)** Political Science; **iii)** History, (iv) Economics.
- 5) Students can change their core subjects within one month from the date of admission before enrolment and registration as per university regulation.
- 1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.
- ▶ Yes, the institution offers self-financed programmes. Such as- (i) Certificate Course in Computer Application conducted by Rajib Ghandhi Computer Swakharata Mission, Govt. of India. (ii) Certificate Course in Spoken English conducted by B.B.C, Bankura.(iii) Certificate Course in Spoken Sanskrit conducted by the Dept. of Sanskrit, BZSM College.(iv) Certificate Course in Creative Dance conducted by Chidambaran Natyashala, Academy of Creative Arts, Shitpukur Lane, Bankura. (v) Short term Beautician Course.
- They differ from other programmes as mentioned below:

**Admission**: The students are admitted by the respective organizations / departments. Marks obtained in the qualifying examination are not considered as strict criteria. Students are admitted into the respective courses on the basis of priority of having practical knowledge and irrespective of cast and creed.

**Curriculum**: The students have to follow a curriculum designed by the organizations / departments which seems to be suitable for the present scenario.

**Fee structure**: The fee structure may be fixed by the respective organizations / departments by consulting with the head of the institution depending upon the number of students in each programme.

No part of the collected amount has to send to the university. However, only in the case of Spoken Sanskrit, the entire course fee is deposited to the college fund. The present fee structure is as given below:

**Teacher qualification**: Teachers having good theoretical as well as practical knowledge on the concerned subject and having a good communication skill are generally selected for the programmes, unlike giving importance only on marks secured in the qualifying examinations.

**Salary**: The amount of salary may vary subject to the enrolment of students. Teachers coming from distant places are likely to get comparatively more salary than the teachers appointed locally.

- 1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.
  - ▶ Taking into consideration the present day demands and keeping in view the needs of girl students, a certificate course in computer application has been introduced to make available better carrier options.
    - There are two Computer Centers consisting of more than 15 computers which the Students may use during any time of college hours.
    - Students of all programmes are encouraged to undergo the Certificate Course in Computer Application from the college.
    - In the department of mathematics one paper deals with computer application and programming.

- Modern methods of teaching are practiced through different audio-visual aids such as Smart boards, LCD projectors, and Power point presentation for comprehensive teaching.
- Students are always encouraged to use Internet in the department or Student's Computer Room or computer based NSS room for searching current information on various topics and subjects so that they can equip themselves to compete in the global employment market.
- 1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?
- ▶ Apart from traditional disciplines the college also offers some new career orientation certificate courses like Computer Application, Spoken English, Spoken Sanskrit and Creative Dance. Besides these courses, the introduction of Beautician Course is also in the offing. Those students who can not avail the chance in regular PG courses of the mother university they may obtain the PG degree of their choice among the nine PG subjects from this college centres of Distance Mode of Education affiliated by the Rabindra Bharati University and The University of Burdwan.

#### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

  - ▶ Keeping in mind the spirit of the vision and mission of the institution the college always insists on sending recommendations to Mother University. During the introduction of new curriculum, the Mother University, on its part, invite the senior faculties of the college who are also members of the Board of Studies to take active role in designing it. The college has always capitalized the opportunities to bring the uniformity on goals and objectives which in turn also bears a thrust on core values adopted by NAAC. The extra-curricular and

extension activities which help the students to build moral and ethical values, serves in the process of integration of academic programmes and institutions goals and objectives.

- 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?
  - ▶ The college is not authorized to develop or restructure the curricula. Curricula are designed by the affiliating university. However while framing the syllabus; the University has on its part invited the senior faculties of the college who are also members of the BOS to take active role in designing the syllabus. Before the participation in such meetings the senior faculty members headed by the Principal discuss with the educationists, guardians, respective departmental students as well as with the office bearers of the Students Union about the needs of the dynamic employment market etc. The opinions, views and suggestions from students, academic peers and departmental faculties are given due attention during the time of the framing of the curriculum by the mother university.

  - ▶ Recently the mother university has introduced a compulsory paper on Environmental Science for all the B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com. students to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. into the curriculum. The Principal, the member of EC at Mother University and some faculty members of the college attended the meeting during the framing of the syllabus of Environmental Science etc.

- ▶ The extra-curricular and extension activities help the students to built moral and ethical values. Lectures on moral values, rallies on environmental consciousness are the regular features of extracurricular activities of the college. In the college there are two N.S.S. units which serve the purpose. Further the frequent arrangement of seminars on the great men like Swami Vivekananda, Rabindranath, Gandhiji, Abdul Kalam Azad and so on helps ensuring holistic development of students by enhancing moral ethical values. The Political Science department arranges lectures in the college seminar hall on human rights with the honorable justices of the Judge Court of Bankura district.
  - ▶ The Carrier Counseling Cell of the college tries to familiarize the students about the carrier prospects after the complication of their degree or certificate courses. For this purpose the college organizes different coaching classes for NET, SET, WBCS, SSC, and PSC by appointing the experts from the college faculties and outsiders.
    - ▶ The community oriented programmes are also organized by the college such as beautician courses, computer courses, course in creative dance and music.

teaching to promote interest of the students in the curriculum by way of organizing various activities like exhibition, quiz competition, seminars, symposia, debates, cultural programmes, educational tours and sports.

The suggestions of the IQAC cell are implemented by the college authority.

▶ During the last four years, Under-Graduate courses in Music and Education have been introduced. Post-Graduate courses in English, Bengali, Sanskrit, History and Political Science in Distance Mode of Education are introduced under the Directorate of Distance Education, The University of Burdwan. The certificate course like Beautician course, Creative Dance and Music are started. These courses are within financial reach of local students due to subsidized fee structure.

  - ▶ Admission to all courses are done strictly to merit basis. The principal, along with senior faculty members of all the departments formulate the merit lists and the lists are published for circulation among students seeking admission. The college also ensures wide publicity and transparency in the admission processes through i) prospectus ii) college website iii) university website iv) college notice board and v) others. This process was followed before the introduction of central online counseling by the University of Burdwan from the academic session of 2013-2014.

The College prepares prospectus and academic calendar every year before declaration of the results of the qualifying examinations. The major rules of admission are given there. The College has a website (<a href="www.bzsmcollege.org">www.bzsmcollege.org</a>) of its own where the admission details are notified.

University has recently introduced a central online counseling system for admission to the prospective students for the various Honours Courses from this year 2013 directly through its website.

  - ▶ For UG Hons. Courses the admission is taken on the basis of merit in the last H.S. or equivalent examinations, but from 2013-14 academic sessions the mother university fully controls the admission centrally through internet system. The college only takes admission according to the recommendation of the university. For UG general courses the admission is taken on the basis of marks in the last H.S. or equivalent examinations in accordance to the need of the locality.

The admission in the UG Arts and Science (Hons.) was encouraging from 2010-11 to 2012-13 when admission process was done internally but after the introduction of centrally online admission the number of students admitted decreases by 33.3%. The possible reason may be the increasing options opted by the students among various colleges under The University of Burdwan. The trend for UGC Science and General students together from 2010-11 to 2013-14 is encouraging as this admission was done internally by the college according to the rush of the students. But for Science graduate the trend is not encouraging the possible reason may be the good students are not coming for general education.

### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

- 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- able students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?
  - ▶ Rarely, we do get differently able students, so there is no special provision required for such students. But recently in 2013-14 sessions one such student has been admitted in the college. Her admission fees, tuition fees and the money required for the purchase of books etc. are donated by a faculty member of the college. Moreover, she has been helped by the Govt. according to the existing rules.

- 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.
  - ▶ At the time of admission in UG courses, counseling sessions are organized for the students for opting available choices in selecting of course as per their need and potential. Before commencement of the programme students are divided into sections on the basis of their marks in previous examination. On the basis of open test of skills students are admitted to NCC and NSS. Through college annual sports students are picked for training & participation in various games, sports, cultural & fine arts events.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?
  - ▶ To bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students' college adopts different strategies such as i) Through unit tests the advanced and non-advanced students are identified. The tutorial classes are arranged for the non-advanced students. ii) The college has established a Remedial Coaching Centre financed by the UGC for the SC, ST, OBC, Physically Challenged etc. iii) The advanced students are also given special classes separately at the departmental level. iv) Group discussion, subject quiz, project works and additional home assignment are given separately to the advanced and slow learners to excel their learning capabilities.
- 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?
  - ▶ There has been a long established tradition of harmonious relation among staff. The Teachers' Council and Non-teaching Staff Council augment the mutual relation to maintain solidarity between them. As the college is the women college, there is no gender problem here. The relation between the students and staff is very cordial.

- 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?
  - ▶ The advanced students are generally identified by the faculty members of the department through Unit Tests, Classroom Teachings and Internal Assessments. They are given special classes and guidance by the faculty members of the concerning department.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
  - ▶ The data and information on the academic performance are collected from the Unit Test, Internal Assessment and Attendance Register of the students at risk of drop out. Finding out the cause of poor academic performance and poor attendance of the students, counseling are arranged for them where they are assured to provide assistance so that they may not discontinue their studies.

## 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)
  - ▶ At the very beginning of the session in consonance with the academic calendar published by Mother University, our college prepares the Academic Calendar every year in consultations with the heads of the departments which get circulated among the students later on. Apart from it, a Teaching Plan is published and provided to the students for the whole academic session. The teachers are advised to submit Teachers' Diary every month to the head of the institution and get it authenticated accordingly. To know the effectiveness of the teaching-learning procedure all the departments hold Unit Tests at regular interval and the teachers are encouraged to give Home Assignments to the students for their benefit. Apart from all these measures to know the effectiveness of the teaching-learning process, teachers voluntarily prepare and submit self-appraisal form to the head of the institution for reporting to the

higher authority as and when required besides the usual procedure of taking filled up feedback form from the students every year.

- 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching -learning process?
  - ▶ The IQAC meets time to time and recommends about some do's and don'ts for the improvement of the teaching and learning process. As for example the library has been fully digitalized recently. The Physics, Chemistry and Geography library have been upgraded for better academic environment.
- 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?
  - ▶ To make learning student-centric the teachers organize group discussions, student seminars, debates, subject quiz, various cultural competitions, annual athletic event every year, and occasionally exhibitions are organized by the departments. Students of the Geography department are motivated to take the responsibility of organizing field tours as per their syllabus. This helps to develop their leadership and management skills. However this scope is not there for students of the other departments. The college has two NSS units and the students are encouraged to enroll in the NSS programmes, like health camp, first aid camp, blood donation camp, legal cell workshop, AIDS awareness programme, etc. The students take part in Youth Parliament and Quiz Contests at the District level and State level; they also participate in Inter College State Athletic Meet at the District and State levels. This enables them to develop various life skills and lifelong learning skills. Apart from these the college organizes some add-on short term courses, like Computer Courses, Spoken English and Spoken Sanskrit Courses, Creative Dance Course, etc., which certainly adds to their lifelong learning experience.
- 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?
  - ► To nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper the students and faculty always utilize journals, magazines, newspapers, books that are available

in the library. They also use internet facility provided by the college to get knowledge of current affairs. Moreover, the faculties often participate in Seminars, Orientation Courses, Refresher Courses, and Conferences at various levels, and impart that knowledge for the benefit of the students. The college invites prominent scholars of relevant areas from time to time to bring the recent developments relevant to their syllabi into the students' notice, and also arrange for inter-college faculty exchange programmes for their benefit. All these efforts aim at transforming the students into life-long learners and innovators.

- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
  - ▶ The teachers use lecture method, interactive method including home assignment, field project (ENVS and Geography), etc. Most of the faculties avail the facilities of computer aided teaching by displaying the relevant topics with the help of laptop, CDs, LCD projector, overhead projector and smart classroom. Various departments organize seminars and exhibitions wherein the students take active part. The college has provided free internet facilities to all faculty members so that they can draw interest among the students about the modern methods of learning.
- 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?
  - ▶ Seminars and popular lectures are organized at the departmental as well as at the college level. More than five departmental National Seminars funded by UGC and State Govt. are organized. The seminars on Blood Donation, HIV-AIDS, Cancer, Legal Aids to helpless women etc. are organized every year by two NSS units of the college. All these help both the students and the faculty to gain advanced level of knowledge and skills.
- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?
  - ▶ The college has a Carrier Counseling Cell which meets time to time with the

3<sup>rd</sup> year students and acquaints them with their future possibilities. The cell in its meeting calls the experts like Chairman CSC, SSC, and PSC etc. to illustrate before the students about various career scopes of today and about the methods to tackle them and how to be successful in building a good career among the students. The cell also provides psycho-social advice to the students.

- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
  - ▶ i) Most of the faculties use laptops and LCD projects in their classroom teaching. ii) Many departments use the Smart Class Room as and when necessary. iii) The college authority has provided the permanent faculty members with a laptop each to adopt modern methods of teaching. iv) The authority also has provided necessary equipments to make a Smart Class Room. The impact of these innovative teaching approaches on student learning is perceptible from their involvement and participation and better results.

# 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?

- ▶ The central library has recently been well-equipped with fully Digitalization of Test Books, Reference Books etc. The library displays new arrival to generate reading interest among the students. Fixed number of books can be issued to both faculty members and students Study halls have been added to the library so that both faculty and students can consult reference books and journals. Photocopies have been provided in the library so that faculty members and students get prints of required pages of books at minimum cost. Students can be seen taking guidance of teachers in study has in the library.
- 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.
  - ▶ Due to various examinations of university and other statuary bodies like PSC, SSC, Rail, Primary Board etc. in this college campus the classroom teaching is disturbed. To overcome the persistence problem the college has

built an examination hall and a multi-purpose seminar hall for the said purpose. Curriculum of various programmes is covered within the stipulated time frame. The deficiency, if any, is addressed by the extra classes to complete the curriculum in that subject.

# 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

▶ To monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning the college administration generally adopts some measures like – i) providing teaching-learning support system, ii) Motivation through meetings with faculty members, iii) Discussion in course completion with the head of the department, iv) Taking feedback from the final year students, v) Conducting result meeting with the faculties of each department separately etc.

## 2.4 Teacher Quality

- 2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.
- ▶ The members of the faculty are recruited as per the rules prescribed by the UGC, Govt. of West Bengal and W.B. College Service Commission. The procedure is as given below-
- i) For recruiting teachers of fulltime permanent and Govt. sanctioned posts firstly subject wise requisitions are placed before the DPI and West Bengal College Service Commission (W.B.C.S.C.). The W.B.C.S.C. holds interviews of the U.G.C. qualified candidates, and then the selected candidates are empanelled for recruitment. The CSC recommends from its panel as per the previous requisition sent by the college.

- ii) Recruitment of Permanent Part Time teachers has been done following the State Govt. rules.
- iii) The Governing Body resolves to advertise for the posts of Guest Teachers when vacancy arises due to retirement (or is deemed necessary otherwise). After fulfilling the terms and conditions laid by the DPI (WB) the post is advertised by the Principal of the college in local and national newspapers. Candidates with the required qualifications are called for interview and accordingly after interview, the duly formed selection committee prepares a panel of successful candidates as per the guidelines laid down by the college authority. From the panel made by the selection committee, the G.B. resolves to appoint teachers purely on temporary basis in order of merit.

The college does not have sufficient number of qualified and competent teachers to handle the courses allotted to them. The institution copes with the requirements by appointing guest teachers or contractual teacher purely on temporary basis.

  - ► The college does not have those streams of study like Bio-technology, IT, Bio-informatics etc. So, no staff has been recruited.

The college organized short-time computer and internet literacy programme for the faculty members through our own campus computer centre.

## c) Percentage of faculty

- About 25% of the full-time faculty members are invited as resource persons in workshops/ seminars/ conference organized by the external professional agencies. The Principal and 3 other associate and assistant professors are often called to serve this purpose.

Twenty six (26) teachers of the college participated in external workshops/ seminars/ conference organized by the external professional agencies. It helps them to improve and enhance their teaching quality as well as to gain promotional benefits.

Eight (8) teachers presented papers in seminars/ conferences organized by the professional agencies.

- 2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (e.g.: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)
- ▶ The institutional budget does have a limited financial provision for research and development. For example, the college has constituted a research committee comprises the faculty members from various departments to look after the proposal or application put forwarded specifically by the part-time or guest teachers of our college. After careful consideration or the nitty-gritty of the proposal or application the various modalities of providing financial help is recommended to the Governing Body for its final approval. The Governing Body is very much benevolent and liberal in this respect. Sri Falguni Mukherjee, State Government approved part-time teacher in the department of Sanskrit pursuing Ph.D. under Tirupati University, Andrapradesh has been already provided seed money of lump-sum amount of ₹ 6000.00 for this purpose. In addition, short-duration study leave and on-duty leave was granted to him as and when it was found to be necessary and justified by the Governing Body on the basis of recommendation of the research committee.

For full time teachers, encouragement and sometimes incentive in terms of providing on duty leave for attending or facing Board of Studies Interview during the registration process was given by the head of the institution. It is also decided in the research Committee Meeting that if a teacher is engaged for research work then he or she might be given some class relaxation. Few staff have availed such opportunity for PhD. and Post-doctoral award.

Leave is also sanctioned for participation in various national/international seminars, conferences and workshops. Almost all faculties' members have been participating in the faculty improvement programmes of some kind.

- 2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.
  - ▶ The college is proud to enlist two awards/recognitions during the last five years Dr. Anurupa Mukherjee has completed a UGC Post-Doctoral Research Award Scheme in 2009, and Dr. Sanu Bhattacharya was awarded Fulbright Visiting Lecturer Fellowship to the US in 2012-13.
- 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?
  - ▶ The students of final year are provided with the feedback questionnaires for the evaluation of teachers. Accordingly, when the students submit the same, if there is any grievance concerning teaching or anything else as detected by the feedback evaluation committee comprises the heads of the departments is forwarded to the Principal for the amicable settlement with the concerned teacher.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

- 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?
  - The evaluation methods are communicated to the students through prospectus and through concerned class teachers. The requisite Class Test, Unit Test and Test Examination etc. are decided in the meeting of the Teachers' Council. The various examinations of the college that are conducted during the session are mentioned clearly in the prospectus and also in the academic calendar. Regarding Annual Examinations the mother university publishes communiqués in news papers.

- 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?
  - ▶ There is little scope for Evaluation Reform that can be initiated by the institution itself, because it is under the jurisdiction of the mother university. The university has not done any major evaluation reform in last four years. But the college on its own initiative takes internal assessments like Unit Test, Class Test, Test Examination etc.
- 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?
  - ▶ The college has formed an Examination Committee and a Centre Committee as per the directives of the university. Both the Committees ensure the effective implementation of the Evaluation Reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.
  - ▶ Our affiliating University does not prescribe summative assessment though for our internal quality assessment mechanism we do follow unit tests, class test and finally annual test examination for enabling the students to practice vigorously before appearing in the final examination.
- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.
  - We take care student' academic excellence as well as other personality development enhancement programme through our NSS units and other programmes.
- 2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?
  - The institution monitors the progress of the students through their

performances in the various examinations. This is communicated to the parents through parent-teacher meetings organized at least once in a year. Apart from it, the guardians of the students with very poor performance are communicated over telephone directly by the Principal or by the subject teachers if necessary. After the result out of the annual examination the administration sits separately with each Department to assess the result. In these meetings some remedial measures are decided to be adopted for the better result of the students in the next session.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

There may be grievances of the students regarding under marking, omission of marks, wrong entry of marks etc. These are redressed satisfactorily by the concerned teachers of the department. Some students are suggested to submit the application forms to the university to review their results. A subject wise faculty meeting is called by the principal after each examination to analyze and take necessary remedial measures for the weaker students.

### 2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

- 2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

  The college has clearly stated the learning outcomes to be achieved. The students and staffs are made aware of it through the college prospectus, and thorough meetings of different councils and committees like Teachers' Council, Academic Council, Students' Union, IQAC etc.
- 2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? The student performance and learning outcomes are communicated to the students and staffs through Result Meetings of the Teachers' Council, Department wise Result Meetings, and Parent Teachers Meets etc.

Success rate of Bengali Hons. is quite good, Honours students' pass rate is 100% in the academic session 2011-2012. The department can hold the success rate of for the year 2012-2013. In both the year the university rank is second.

The above comparison shows that the success rate of English Hons. is quite satisfactory. Hons.-students pass rate is 85.16% in the academic year 2010-2011. The result of the Hons.-students degrades in the year 2011-2012 which is 78%. In both the year there is no university rank, but result is overall satisfactory.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

To achieve the intended learning outcome the institution has introduced the healthy practices such as remedial classes, home assignments, tutorials, departmental workshops, seminars, group discussions etc., and it has been observed that students' inclination towards aspiration of acquiring knowledge is growing day by day, and this is reflected in the overall performance of the college at the final examination as well as in various intellectual, cultural and other competitions.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

In addition to the regular academic activities the students are persuaded to go for field work, educational tours to get practical knowledge to enhance the social relevance of the courses offered. Yearly assessment of the progress report undertaken by the college authority is for the quality sustenance and accreditation with regard to teaching-learning and evaluation. The career Counseling Cell works for their future course of academic and practical life. The spoken English course enhances their communication skills. The social and cultural programmes, competitions like debate, extempore, recitation, music, dance etc. helps to bring out hidden talents from the students. Formation of nature club and gym club enhance their social adaptability.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

To overcome the barriers of students' learning the college collects the data from the Feedback Mechanism and Internal Assessment System etc. The collected data are analyzed by the Teachers' Council, relevant departments, Academic Council etc. to recommend measures to be taken by the college authority.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The college monitors and ensures the achievement of learning outcomes through the principal of the college assisted by the Teachers' Council, Academic Council, Examination Committee, IQAC and so on.

Any other relevant information regarding Teaching-Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include.

Yes, at the individual level teacher of the concern department take note of the exam result and accordingly call up the students and given advice, suggestion or lesion plan for the improvement of the same. Very often departmental meeting including students are conducted where students were given free hand to ask any problem for the improvement of the result. At the collective level, students' performance at various examinations is discussed at the teachers council meeting are accordingly suggestions or remedial measures were adopted which are later on implemented positively.

The committee also encourage the teacher for minor and major research projects under UGC etc.

- 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?
  - ▶ The college extends all possible supports to researchers. All the following facilities are provided:-

# 3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

  - ▶ The priority area for research is socio-economic studies of the contemporary issues relevant to the subjects.

  - ▶ The institution takes several efforts in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the college campus, such as the Ministers of Education, Govt. of West Bengal, eminent literary persons, historians, philosophers etc. Interactive sessions of faculty members were organized with them.

  - About 10 % of the permanent UGC approved faculty members have enjoyed Sabbatical Leave for research activities. As for example, Dr. Anurupa Mukhopadhyay had been sanctioned Special Study Leave with pay for a period of three years to obtain Post-Doctoral Research Award. The title of her topic was "Standardization in Santali Language". Her topic is very popular among the staff and students which enhance their interests about this tribal language. Dr. Sanusree Bhattacharya had been Awarded the Fulbright Scholarship by the USA consulate as visiting fellow to deliver lectures on the topic entitled 'Non-violence in Jain Perspective' at Florida International University, Florida and Elizabeth Town college, Pennsylvania in USA during the academic session 2012-13.

- ▶ The institutional budget does have a limited financial provision for research and development. The college has constituted a Research Committee comprises the faculty members from various departments to look after the proposal or application put forwarded specifically by the part-time or guest teachers of our college. After careful consideration of the proposal, the various modalities for providing financial help is recommended to the Governing Body for its final approval. The Governing Body is very much benevolent and liberal in this respect. There are many instances to provide seed money to needy teachers as mentioned before.

  - ▶ Sri Falguni Mukherjee, State Government approved permanent part-time teacher in the department of Sanskrit pursuing Ph.D. under Tirupati University, Andrapradesh was given seed money for the amount of ₹ 6000.00 for this purpose. In addition to short-duration study leave, sometimes on-duty leave also to sanctioned to him as and when it was found to be necessary and justified by the Governing Body on the basis of recommendation of the Research Committee. The part-time permanent teachers (14) may avail this facility.

  - ▶ The college provides financial help to the students for pursuing project work or dissertation in the respective subject. Sometime in the departments of History, Political Science, Geography visit to the Historical places or the political institutions are important, the college provides financial help for this purpose.

As for example, on 21.04.2014 and 22.04.2014 the Economics department and Geography department of the college in collaboration with the neighboring Bankura Sammilani College organized a inter-disciplinary seminar on "Population Growth and Environment: Some Bio-Physical Limit And Sustainability". Several external resource persons and experts of both the discipline interact with the teachers and students which helped to improve the research culture.

This committee looks after the research activities of both the teachers and students. As per the recommendation of this committee the college provides financial help to the students for pursuing project work or dissertation in the respective subject. Sometime in the departments of History, Political Science, Geography for which field visit or visit to the Historical places or the political institutions are important, the college provides financial help for this purpose. About 30,000 books in the central library, the computer system with internet connectivity are opened to faculty and students scholars for the research activities.

  - ► The institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers are as follows:-

  - c) To well-equip the library with more computer and other modern equipments
  - d) To provide 24 hours free internet facilities with Wi-Fi zone, INFLIBNET, laboratory facilities etc.

  - ▶ The institution received special grants from the UGC and State Govt. for developing the research culture among the teachers and students. In 2009 an amount of ₹ 3, 46,458/-and in 2010 an amount of ₹ 10, 20,000/- were sanctioned by UGC for the purchase of modern equipment like computers, LCD projector, laptops etc. Recently the State Govt. has sanctioned ₹ 7,00,000/- for the purchase of new instruments, computers, books etc. The Physics and Chemistry laboratories are well-equipped utilizing the grants sanctioned for his purpose. All these have developed the research culture in the college.

  - ▶ To provide the facilities to the students and research scholars outside the campus, the college has taken steps like a) providing seed money for the research activities, b) providing laptops and other equipments, c) granting leaves for this purpose etc.

  - ▶ Yes, we do provide consultancy services in terms of community development as well as community sensitization programmes undertaken by the two NSS units (1&2) in their chosen adopted villages, named Champakeyari and Panchbaga within the perimeter of Bankura District town. Socio-economic survey of our two adopted villages is done by two NSS units every year. Community development programmes are taken like offering one day's token manual labor construction and maintenance of roads leading to voluntary participation of the villagers to do the same. Community sensitization programme are conducted like child health care, AIDS awareness, legal awareness and cleanliness of their surroundings, personal hygiene specifically for women living in busti and slam areas, family planning programmes etc.

- 3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?
  - ▶ Consultancy services provided free of cost to the villagers and slum-dwellers by all the stakeholders of the college. Therefore all the stakeholders involved in the process are given leeway of various kinds like reduction of classes, issuing certificates, grace marks for students in the college examinations, if required, concession in the mandatory class attendance, etc.

  - ▶ In the NSS advisory committee, Panchayat functionaries of the respective villages, local medical practioners, local Government authority, important personalities of the localities are invited time-to-time to chalk out the action plan, their moralities to be adopted every year in the adopted villages, and slum areas ensuring thereby a solid bondage of network among all stakeholders involved in the process.
- 3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?
  - ▶ The college always emphasizes the need of inviting NGOs like Gandhi Vichar Parishad and philanthropic originations like Lions club of Bankura, Voluntary Blood Donors' Association of Bankura. We also invite experts from Projapita Iiswariya Visvavidyalaya, Bankura branch for organizing Yoga and Meditation Camps both in the college and the adopted villages.

  - i) Socio-economic survey of our two adopted villages by two NSS units every year.
  - ii) Community development programme like offering one day's token manual labor construction and maintenance of roads leading to voluntary participation of the villagers to do the same.
  - iii) Community sensitization programme like child health care, AIDS awareness, legal awareness and cleanliness of their surroundings, personal hygiene specifically for women living in busti and slam areas, family planning programmes etc.
  - iv) Blood donation camps are organized on the occasion of 'Bal-Diavas' to commemorate the birth-day of Chacha Nehru.
  - v) The seminars on Free Legal Aid have been organized by the NSS units to aware the women stakeholders of both the students and the villagers.

  - ▶ When the college organizes the various extension activities, like Thalassemia check-up camp, Blood Donation Camp, HIV-AIDS Awareness programme, literacy programme among drop out school children etc., the local community gets a great relief. The local people of the surrounding areas are always fond of these extension programmes and wait very eagerly for the next camp.

  - ▶ Our affiliated University, i.e., the University of Burdwan has highly appreciated the extension activities undertaken by the two units of NSS. ▶ The institution aims at creating and enhancing of infrastructure and learning recourses as per the demand of the day to facilitate effective teaching and learning. The college has its own perspective master plan where details of the existing building and the future infrastructural plan for enhancing and facilitating teaching-learning process are clearly earmarked. The total perspective plans are divided into different phases to be taken for its implementation under different academic sessions. The phase wise infrastructural plan are placed initially in the IQAC meeting for its detail discussion to be later on placed and approved in the GB meeting. The GB in its meeting approves the phase wise plan considering the financial capabilities and urgency of the plan. The infrastructure is divided into three categories-a) For academic activities, b) Co-curricular activities and c) Extracurricular activities. The college tries her best to provide it as far as practical.

#### 4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- a) Curricular and co-curricular activities classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.
- b) Extra –curricular activities sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skillsdevelopment, yoga, health and hygiene etc.
- a) So far as the academic activities are concerned, the college has sufficient numbers of class rooms equipped with light and ceiling fans, black boards, benches, tables, chairs, maps, charts, well equipped laboratories, overhead projectors, computers, LCD projectors. In every block of the college there are wash-rooms, pure drinking water etc.
- b) To run the co- curricular activities like seminar/workshop on Drama, debating competition, extempore speech, etc., the institution has extended its existing

auditorium incorporated with a large and modern stage. Very recently a Multi-Purpose Seminar Hall of 4500 sq. ft. has been constructed which can be used for this purpose.

The college has two NSS units. Accordingly, to motivate the students towards these voluntary services, it provides the volunteers necessary instructions for the purpose of social awareness activities in and around the district of Bankura.

- c) For music and other cultural activities, the college has a very good open-air stage.
- For Gymnasium, it has a Gym club equipped with all requisite facilities. Moreover, the college has recently built up a Multi-gym. For outdoor games, the college has a playground. Besides, the college also provides the students all sports accessories. For music, social programmes, conference, etc. college has begun to use the newly built auditorium.
- 4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized?   - ▶ The college has fully utilized the UGC and State Govt. grants with additional expenses from its internal sources in developing the essential infrastructure to make the academic requirements of growing number of women students. For optimal utilization of college rooms and other infrastructural facilities, the classes of the PG Distance Education Courses with about 1200 students are run on every Sunday. Along with the extension of the existing buildings, the college has built

up new class rooms and a reading room in first floor of library building to facilitate the academic growth.

It has also constructed a seminar cum conference hall incorporating with audio – visual facilities on the top floor of the existing library building.

For promotion of extracurricular activities, the college has extended the existing auditorium. It has also newly constructed the stage of the auditorium and a gym. Details augmentations of the infrastructural facilities to see its academic growth during last five years are as follows:

- The students of the hostels can use library in the holydays.
- An internet and Wi-Fi facility is available on the college campus. It can be used by the hostel students also.
- Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipments is available in Girls' hostel.
- Security has been outsourced to Diamond Security Service Limited.
- Pure drinking water and coolers are available for both the general students and hostel-students.
- Wash-room and toilets for ladies and gents are available all over the campus including the hostels.
- A facility for medical emergencies is available. The ambulance of Bankura Municipality can be used for the emergencies cases. Bankura B.S. Medica College and Hospital is very co-operative in this regard.

▶ The provisions of health centre located in our college campus where doctors from different discipline are made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus including hostels. Few local doctors have given their helping hand in this regard.

2. **Goal** : Efficient and fast disposal of works

3. The Context Bankura Zilla Saradamani Mahila Mahavidyapith is delivering services to large number of students, around 1500 in number. The college is spread over 2.5 acres of land with different teaching blocks accommodating 14 Departments besides offices of NSS, P.G Study Centers of the University of Burdwan and Rabindra Bharati University, College Library, Laboratories. Clerical staff working in the college falls short of the actual requirement. To process admission, fee collection, examination and other works of students is a tremendous task which can hardly be efficiently coped by existing clerical staff. There are so many other demands on account of reporting, accounting and managing diverse affairs of the college. Under the circumstances, it was planned to implement the scheme of e-administration. However, the college has to face a major challenge of popularizing the new technology among employees accustomed to old manual practice. Another challenge is to train all the clerical staff to handle their work through e-administration technology.

4. The Practice: E-administration is being implemented in gradual manner, Management & Admission System software is specially designed to cover the various administrative and financial tasks of the college as per University Statutes, circulars and directives of the State Government. Admission, Pay roll, fees collection and accounting repots generation, audit report generation are implemented in the first stage. Staff working in these sections were motivated and trained with some incentives. Now, these sections are fully computerized and managed by a small number of clerical staff. In the second stage, College Library has been linked to the Server with specially designed

software (SOUL 2.0), provided by the U.G.C, which controls accession of books, cataloguing, issue and return of the book and finally generates no dues report to each and every student through a digitized process. This process of bar coding for all the books has recently been completed. Besides this, the college has procured an e-shelf containing more than 10,000 e-books and journals, along with the facility of INFLIBNET. Thus the College Library has been turned to a Digitized Library.

5. Evidence of success: Implementation of e-administration has eased the whole office administration. Admission process has become easy and user friendly, by using this admission software the process of selection on merit bass under various categories has become more transparent. Fees collection and timely deposit of cash have been ensured. Daily accounts register, audit and other reports are automatically generated. Salary reports are generated without error in time by means of our own software and the COSA, the software provided by the State Government for financial management. Repetitive generation of various types of reports demanded by the University, State Government, Central Government and other agencies like UGC are prepared with ease. This has eased the workload on college administration. Despite shortage of clerical staff in comparison to huge structure and diversity of jobs, administration and governance has become effective.

Besides this our college has initiated the whole process of lending books in the library by digitizing the system and thus the system has become easier and quicker, though handled by a few library staff. Installation of SOUL in the library has made easier in keeping records of the huge number of books and journals kept in the library. It is to be mentioned that the success story of e-administration in our college has prompted other institutions also to go for computerization.

6. Problems encountered and Resources Required: First and foremost a problem was the reorientation of mindset of our staff members who were accustomed to the old practice. Second challenge was to make them prepare by means of training to handle the college administration software (CAMS).

One strategic problem was to check errors during transaction of different activities by our staff. The college implemented e-administration in different stages. In the first stage, important transaction is preserved manually too. To overcome any error during handling of new software, some professionals from the software company are hired to assist and train our staff. At present our office staff are well conversant with statutory needs and software functioning. However the software company is contacted as and when required to customize our programming to best suit our needs.

For the purpose of improvisation in the process of digitization in library, the work has been done partly outsourcing the job due to shortage of staff in the library. With a view to properly handle the SOUL software in the library, provided by the University Grants Commission, our Librarian was sent to Ahmedabad for training for handling the said software.

- 7. **Notes (Optional):** It is true that the colleges established in rural and semiurban places, especially in economically backward areas have been facing problems arising out of paucity of funds, shortage of staff, infrastructure etc. Considering the frustrating scenario, we are striving at reaching our target: to impart quality education in Higher Education Institution and the following measures have been adopted by our institution in this regard:-
- > To develop personality of students through community services
- ➤ Well acquaintance with modern gadgets and e-resources
- ➤ To make them well verse in National and International languages
- ➤ To enlighten villagers and slum dwellers through value education by NSS volunteers of the college to help poor farmers and artisans by virtue of technical training etc.
- ➤ To spread scientific knowledge with a view to eradicate superstations and social stigmas with the help of members of the Women's Cells and NSS volunteers
- > To impart ethical teachings to bring back the derailed people from anti-social activities like separatist movement etc.

➤ To inculcate values of National Integrity among students

Considering the various constraints, our college is adopting the following measures to reach the target of excellence in higher education: —

- ➤ Intra-college and Inter college Faculty Exchange Programme
- ➤ Inter college borrowing facilities of books and journals etc. for both teachers and students
- ➤ To maximize the number of seminars/symposia/workshops in collaboration with other higher education institutions or Universities.
- ➤ To sign memorandum of cooperation (MOC) with other colleges for undertaking different kind of exchange programmes.




#### **Challenges:**

# PEER TEAM REPORT ON THE ASSESMENT AND ACCREDITATION OF THE BANKURA ZILLA SARADAMANI MAHILA MAHAVIDYAPITH

#### Section 1: Preface

The Bankura Zilla Saradamani Mahila Mahavidyapith (BZSMM), Bankura was established on 27 August 1973 as the only Degree College for women in a backward district of West Bengal. The mission was to impart multifaceted knowledge for spreading higher education among the girls thereby to encourage life long learning while making meaningful contribution to career building of the weaker section of the society. The goal also included awareness on environmental pollution and rights and duties of the women. The college was affiliated to the Burdwan University and accorded recognition by the University Grants Commission Under 2 (F) on 19 October 1981. The college is located at Bankura with a campus area of 2.495 acres. It receives annual grant-in-aid from the State Government for its sustenance. The college provides Degree Courses in Arts and Science with option for Bengali, English, Geography, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Philosophy, Economics and Mathematics (in B.A.) and Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics in B. Sc. Honours courses are offered in Geography, Economics and Mathematics.

The course programme is annual. There is provision of electing a subject of one's own choice in BA as stipulated in the University regulation. The syllabus is framed by the affiliating University and the College has no say in the matter. Though there are 21 sanctioned Teaching Posts only 17 have been filled up. Similarly, against 14 sanctioned non teaching posts, 12 have been filled up. There are 2 part time Technical Personnels and 17 part time teachers. The Management has appointed 1 full time Teacher and two part-time teachers for the science programme. All these personnels belong to the State of West Bengal. The student strength being 1272, the Teachers Students ratio is 1:37.

PKM is hor 18.03 The BZSM Mahavidyapith applied to the National Assessment and Accreditation Council, Bangalore (an Autonomous Body) in December 2006 for assessment and accreditation by submitting the Self Study Report as per rules. According to the National Assessment and Accreditation Council, Bangalore constituted a Peer Team with Prof. P. K. Mishra, former Vice Chancellor, North Orissa University, Baripada. Orissa as the Chairman and Prof. Bijay Kumar Mishra, Professor and Head, Department of Chemistry, Sambalpur University, Jyotivihar as Member and Prof. B. N. Deka former Principal, Rangia College, Kamrup as the Member Coordinator. The Peer Team visited the college on 17-18 March 2007 to assess and evaluate the Institution on the basis of the stipulated seven point criteria of the NAAC and after making an objective analysis of the Self Study Report and the performance of the college by visiting the Departments and support services, meeting the Management, Guardians, Teaching and non Teaching Staffs, Students and the Alumni and all other stake holders, made the following observations / recommendations.

#### Section 2: Criteria Wise Analysis

#### Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The college is exclusively for girls education in Arts and Science. Though the College is situated in an urban area, the girl students are mostly from the villages. The college has a suitable number of SC/ST students who are given special attention to appear in various competitive examinations after Graduation. The College tries for all round growth of students, besides creating awareness on environmental studies which is compulsory.

In BA, there are both General and Honours Programmes in Bengali, English, Geography, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Philosophy, Economics and Mathematics. In B. Sc., there is General course in Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics. The curricula are designed by Burdwan University and modernization is done under University provision. Programme options are there. There are different cut off marks for admission. Internet facility is available for the students and teachers.

PRMishon 18,03 There is flexibility in pursuing programmes. Personal coaching is given to slow and disadvantaged learners. Advanced learners are given reference books.

There is feed back mechanism through Questionnaires. Such feed backs help the college to identify strength and weaknesses. Quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures are done through Guest Lectures. An Academic calendar is given to all students after admission.

#### Criterion II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

The College follows a transparent admission policy. There is an Admission Committee to monitor admission. A prospectus with all rules and regulations is given on application. Reservation rules for the SC/ST/OBC students are adhered to. Provision of counseling is also there. Among 1272 students in Under Graduate Classes 642 are in Honours. Assessment of the students is done by skill test, group discussion, quiz test, aptitude test, seminars and language test. The college takes care of the disadvantaged group through intensive teaching in tutorial class. Time Table is rigorously followed. Teacher's workload is notified to the students. Teachers are strictly advised to follow teaching schedule. Daily diary of teachers is maintained. Academic calendar is a strict guideline for both the teachers and students.

The college encourages creative writing through wall magazines, seminar lectures, use of library, interaction, debate and exhibition etc. The teaching – learning system is full proof. Examination, Group Survey and Study Tours are also organized. Assessment of students is done through periodical examinations. Besides curricular activities, examinations activities are also monitored. Teacher's knowledge is updated by new library books, magazines, seminars and debates. The teachers are encouraged to attend Refresher and Orientation courses.

The teachers are appointed by the Governing Body as per the recommendation of West Bengal College Service Commission. They are deputed to attend seminars and provided with internet facilities. There are computers and audio visual aids. Teachers are evaluated by the Teachers council. Feedback from the students is given due weightage. If defects are detected, the remedial measures are taken. There is a continuous process of assessment.

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# Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The college encourages research culture by granting study leave for doing M. Phil course and for attending Seminars/Workshop etc. During absence of Teachers the class teaching is adjusted. Research journals are subscribed for. Four Teachers have received Ph.D. Degree and Three have received M.Phil degree.

Some teachers are engaged in Post Doctoral work. Teachers are publishing research papers in Nationals Journals in Bengali, Economics, Philosophy and Political Science. Some Teachers are engaged in post graduate teaching in the Study Centres of Rabindra Bharati University. The NSS units are engaged in extension activities by organizing special camps for the growth of literacy, public health and hygiene, medical check-up, remedy for drug addiction and awareness for child reproductive health and nutrition. Blood donation camps are also held. Some teachers are involved in programmes like cultural heritage and entrepreneurship development. They also work to ensure justice for the underprivileged section of the society. During the recent years, the teachers have attended 10 National and 2 International Seminars. They have published 2 book and 39 papers. The Victoria Memorial, Kolkata provided Rs.39,000/- to organize Work-shop. For consultancy work the college has earned Rs.4100/-. Two research projects are ongoing now. One Teacher has been selected for UGC Research award in the Tenth Plan period.

#### Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College has a campus area of 2.495 acres and a Master Plan for infrastructural growth. Building with 3844.90 sft plinth area accommodation is adequate for now. There is a library with computer and internet facilities. There is a play ground inside the campus. The students have been provided with more Indoor game facilities than Outdoor games. The College has an open air theatre, cycle stand, canteen, hostel, generator set, Photocopier, common room and staff toilet. There is a cheap stationery store. The Central Library has 19,360 books out of which 15,140 are text books, 4200 are reference books and 6 journals. The library opens at 10.00 AM and closes at 5 PM and has been computerized. There is also open access system. A Library Committee looks after purchase of books and journals. There is a trained librarian who takes care of entry and issue. New arrivals are properly displayed and

Punishers 18.03 computer services are extended to students and staff. Average number of books issued per day is 50 and about 1500 users visit the library every month.

The hostel has 19 rooms accommodating 120 boarders. Dining hall and kitchen are spacious. Television set has been provided. Monthly Health checkup is held. Students participate in National and University level sports meets. The students have won prizes in athletic meets.

#### Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The BZSM Mahavidyapith has 1272 students on roll now. As a Women's college having only BA and BSc courses, the figure is quite encouraging. They come from Bankura and adjacent districts of West Bengal. Among 1272 students 1113 are general, 50 OBC, 73 SC and 36 ST students. The drop out rate is 9.67% for Hon's and 13.31% for general course. A microscopic number go for PG Course after graduation. Some of them have got employment in schools as teachers. Three have qualified in NET and two have qualified in SLET. The college provides Hostels, Library, Free-studentship and students-aid. There are endowment prizes for brilliant performance in BA pass and Hon's examinations. The SC/ST students get stipends. There is an Employment cell. There is an Alumni Association. A list of distinguished Alumni is available in the College. The Alumni have donated money for the development of the College. There is also a Grievance Redressal Cell. The College has taken steps for enhancing the quality of education through Tests and Seminars. The pass % shows 83.00% in 2006. There is a cell to prevent sexual harassment.

The Teachers attended Legal Advisory Cell workshop at Bankura. Students are given various incentives for sports and the college organizes sports meets, beside participating in University meets.

The college collects feedbacks and after analyzing them forward them to the DPI. The students take parts in seminars and Quiz Competitions. They also take part in extra-curricular functions like drama, music and recitation etc.

#### Criterion VI: Organization and Management

The College has a Governing Body to take administrative policy decisions in development of infrastructure. It ensures the attainment of goals like achieving

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excellence in all academic efforts, holistic education to the students, making Arts and Science education relevant to the job market and in developing the students as good citizens. The Principal executes the decision of the Governing Body. He ensures deployment of staff for career improvement. There are various Committees to assist the principal in administration and cultural activities. The recommendations of the committees are approved by the Governing Body for implementation. The Teachers Council meets at least twice a year.

There is provision for perspective planning for all round development of the College.

The Academic calendar is approved by the Governing Body.

The Governing body also appoints temporary staff or on contract basis. The teacher's diary is maintained for their assessment. The Inspector of College and Registrar of the affiliating University periodically conducts inspections. The college mobilizes funds through donation from the MPs and other Philanthropic Agencies. Annual Audit is regularly conducted.

### **Criterion VII: Healthy Practices**

The poor and meritorious students are provided with books more than what is authorized. Half and Full free studentship are given. College provides subsidized hostel accommodation to SC/ST students.

Proposal for a modern hostel has been approved by the UGC. Exhibition and cultural programmes are organized. Campus beautification is given due emphasis. Process of computerization of the Library is going on. Resource generation efforts are continuously taken up. Democratic functioning is encouraged. Internal quality checks have been adopted. Self appraisal for teachers is in practice. Non-teaching staff efficiency is closely supervised. Departmental meetings are held to ensure quality teaching. Teacher's evaluation forms are analyzed by the Principal who takes corrective measures. Intensive coaching is adhered to for better results. Students' views are taken while fixing College examination schedule. Students' forum conducts students-teachers-interaction. A suggestion books entertains suggestion of students. Guest lecturers are invited.

Teaching plan and teachers diaries are maintained. Inter college events like debates are organized.

Punisher 18 0) Value education is included by prayer and lighting of the lamp. Patriotic porgrammes are held on 26 January and 15 August. Brotachare (Yogic and physical exercise) camps are organized.

Teachers accept counseling the students with pleasure. NSS units play active social service roles. Youth Camps for Healthy Society are regularly organized. Ten days are spent in adopted village. Programme of literacy and public health are organized. Blood Donation Camps and Health Checkup Camps are held. Relief materials are collected for Tsunami and Earthquake victims. Collected money for the purpose was donated to PM's relief fund. World AIDS/HIV days are held as per schedule. Pulse Polio Vaccination, Tree Plantation and Road Repairing Programmes are held.

Strategic planning is followed for Academic planning exercise. There is a Question Bank to help students. Educational Tours, Field Survey are conducted. Students are involved in College administration. Reputed personalities are invited to college to give lectures. Student union election is hassle free. Students are given opportunity for class presentation with the help of teaching aids. International women's day was organized on 08.03.2006. Workshop on Women's health related problems were held on 17.01.2007. MOU with BBC to introduce conversational English language courses was signed.

#### Section 3: Overall Analysis:

- The BZSM Mahavidyapith during its existence of 36 years has firmly consolidated itself with high reputation for discipline and good teaching among Girls' students.
- Though the course programme is highly traditional and expansion for Science Course has been undertaken very recently on the initiative of the Management, the teaching and assessment methods have a solid base of innovation and sincerity.
- The role of the Management is quite evident in running the show properly.
- The Principal and the Teaching Staff are no less praise-worthy for their team effort.

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#### Section 4: - Confidential

#### Suggestions / Recommendations

- > The Guardians and the students wholeheartedly expressed their desire to have Short- term Vocational Courses on Music, Fashion Design, Beauty parlour and Nutrition etc.
- ➤ There is scope of having computer unit at least with 5-10 systems to give training to the students on payment basis. Since there is a Hostel with 120 inmates in the campus, the unit will run on self financing scheme successfully.
- ➤ A First Aid Centre and more provision of indoor and outdoor games may be provided.
- ➤ There should be a move of taking over the Management of the college by the Government so that the Science Stream which was opened in 2006 can be consolidated and full time Teachers can be appointed.
- ➤ Most of the Teachers are non Ph.D.s. They may be encouraged to do Ph.D.
- > Teachers may be encouraged to publish research articles in National and International journals.
- > The vacant posts of Teaching and non-teaching staff may be filled up on priority basis.
- ➤ Multiple copies of text books, reference books and standard journals and magazines may be purchased to enrich the library.
- A Yoga cum Meditation centre may be opened.

The above steps will help in promoting women education further.
